Getting to Know **United Airlines Guam Station Chief Pilot Errol Lee**

Growing up in New York City, I discovered my passion for aviation early. On my 13th birthday, I took my first glider flight, and from that moment on, I knew flying would be a lifelong pursuit. Like many young aviation enthusiasts, I dreamed of becoming an astronaut, but that dream ultimately led me to an equally rewarding career in professional aviation.

My professional aviation journey began as a flight instructor, where I developed a passion for teaching and mentoring aspiring pilots. I later served as Senior Check Pilot at Comair Aviation Academy and then as a Professor and Chief Ground Instructor at Jacksonville University, helping educate the next generation of aviation professionals. From there, I transitioned to the airlines, flying for Comair Airlines before joining Continental Airlines, which later became United Airlines.

Throughout my career with Continental and United, I have had the privilege of serving in a variety of roles, including Ground Instructor, Pilot Recruiter, Pilot Interviewer, Flight Manager, Assistant Chief Pilot, and now Chief Pilot. Each position has reinforced the importance of leadership, teamwork, and supporting others in achieving their full potential.

I arrived in Guam in 2009 expecting to stay for only six months. Instead, I fell in love with the island, its culture, and, most importantly, its people. Guam quickly became more than just a work assignment—it became home.

Today, I consider it a privilege to serve the pilots and community here while flying throughout Micronesia, where every flight offers an opportunity to connect people across these beautiful islands.

As Chief Pilot, I lead the Chief Pilot's Office (CPO), which is responsible for supporting more than 180 pilots based in Guam. Our office assists pilots with both their professional and personal needs, helps develop and maintain our Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs), and works closely with operational teams to ensure safe and efficient flight operations. I am fortunate to work alongside three outstanding team members whose dedication keeps our department running smoothly. My leadership philoso-

phy is simple: remove obstacles so that they have the tools and support they need to do their best work for our pilots.

People often ask me what I enjoy most about my job. My answer has never changed. The airport is a microcosm of humanity. Every human emotion can be found there. It is a place of joyful reunions, new friendships, exciting adventures, heartfelt goodbyes, and sometimes profound loss. Love, hope, excitement, sadness, and even frustration all pass through an airport every day. As a pilot, knowing that I play a small part in bringing people together during life's most meaningful moments is incredibly fulfilling. Whether helping someone celebrate a wedding, reunite with family, begin a new career, or return home during difficult times, it reminds me that aviation is ultimately about serving people.

Outside of aviation, I enjoy teaching traditional Japanese martial arts and traveling to different parts of the world. Lifelong learning has always been important to me. I hold an Associate of Applied Science in Aviation Technology, a Bachelor of Science in Aviation Science, and an MBA. Looking ahead, one of my personal goals after retirement is to pursue a Ph.D., continuing my commitment to education and personal growth.

Perhaps my greatest career goal is not another title or achievement but giving back to the community I now call home. I hope to inspire Guam's young people to pursue their dreams, especially those who may be considering a future in aviation. The aviation industry offers countless opportunities—for pilots, mechanics, dispatchers, engineers, and many other professions—and I hope my journey shows that with dedication, hard work, and perseverance, those dreams are achievable.

It has been an honor to make Guam my home for the past 17 years, and I look forward to continuing to serve our pilots, our passengers, and this incredible island community.

United Airlines' Bring Your Family to Work Day

Their day ended with a planeside observation of Flight UA76's arrival from Saipan and lunch hosted by UA.

Guam Airport Braves Super Typhoon Bavi



It was a challenging start to the month of July as Super Typhoon Bavi impacted Guam and the Northern Mariana Islands. Bavi, which caused widespread power outages, torrential rainfall, and downed power lines, swept through our region just months after Super Typhoon Sinlaku left Guam and its neighboring islands still in recovery mode. Even before Governor Lou Leon Guerrero declared Condition of Readiness (COR) 1 on July 5, 2026, GIAA management and staff were hard at work securing the main terminal and its surrounding properties and facilities, meeting with airport stakeholders, airlines, and tenants, and providing updates and

notifications to the public and the airport community regarding operations and changes in flight schedules. GIAA extends its appreciation to all who worked around the clock and enacted preventative measures to secure facilities and reinforce vulnerable equipment to prevent wind damage prior to the typhoon's arrival. Facilities remained opened and were staffed with emergency responders to ensure readiness for post-storm relief flights.

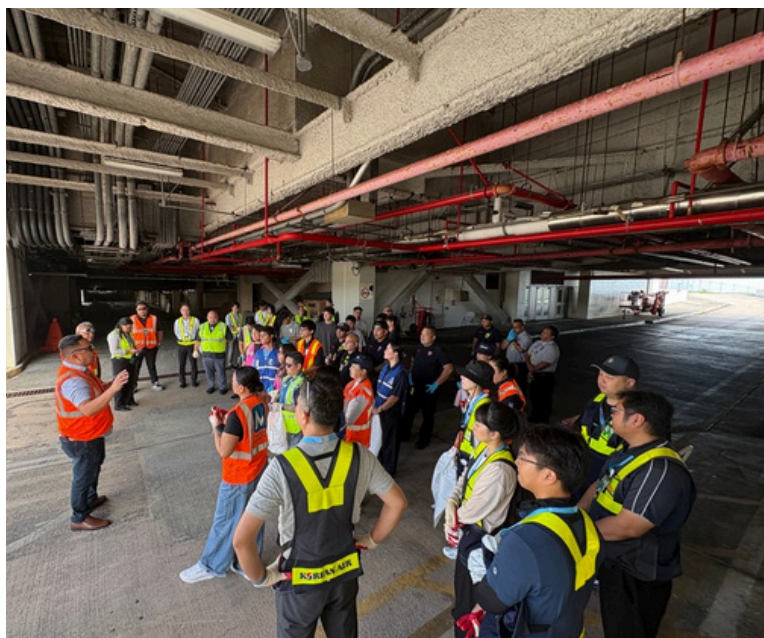
